Social bookmarking is a relatively new and informal way of discovering Internet resources.

Social bookmarking sites allow people to save, share and "tag" their lists of favourite / bookmarks?ed websites. While many people use the sites as a way of storing their own lists of useful Web resources, an additional benefit is that everyone else can then view and search the collections of others. This is still quite an experimental way of conducting online research, but with so many people using these sites, it may well be worth a try.

### *Pros*

- Millions of people worldwide use these services to save their lists of useful Web resources, so you can tap into this collective knowledge.
- Useful for saving your own lists of useful links, which you can then access from any networked computer.

### *Cons*

- Can be "hit and miss" for academic research.
- Can take a lot of time to sift through all the results.
- It's a free-for-all as people can tag items with anything they want.

### RSS newsfeeds and alerts

Internet research need not only be about searching - some services bring the information to you. These days many researchers set up accounts on online services that deliver information directly to them, based on their research interests.

#### *RSS newsfeeds*

RSS newsfeeds let you see when selected websites and blogs have added new content. You need software to read the newsfeed, or to have an account on a newsfeed service, but this is free.

- [Firefox Web browser](#) - use the in-built Live Bookmarks feature in Firefox to monitor your RSS feeds.

It's not just blogs and news sites that provide RSS feeds - many academic resources do too. For example:

- [ZETOC: RSS](#) - a service from the British Library - lets you monitor the latest articles from academic journals.

#### *Alerting services*

Alerting services let you sign up to receive updates about new resources in your areas of interest as they appear. For example:

- [Google alerts](#) Sign up for email updates of the latest Google results (Web, news etc).

#### *Pros*

- Good for current information.
- Lets the information come to you, rather than having to actively search.
- Useful for monitoring new resources in your subject area over time.

#### *Cons*

- Not necessarily the best information.
- May cause information and email overload.

- Only yield recent additions, so not good for retrospective review of relevant resources.
